

Trinity Joins Eight Other NE MN Synod Churches in Advocacy Letter Writing Pilot Project

Under the auspices of Lutheran Advocacy of Minnesota, Minnesota Interfaith Power and Light, the Ecofaith Network, and the NE MN Synod office, Trinity has recently begun weekly gatherings in which congregants are encouraged to write letters to their elected officials about issues of concern. This effort arises out of our call as people of faith to defend neighbors (as broadly and biblically defined) who are mistreated and vulnerable, and to defend and protect God's creation from further degradation and destruction. We often feel helpless or overwhelmed, wondering how we can respond in a meaningful way to such enormous challenges.



Lutherans believe that good government is a gift from God intended for the safety and flourishing of human life and the environment. But recent events have revealed a wide range of distressing events which document a federal government - especially the executive branch - which seems to be acting in a manner antithetical to those values. If governmental authorities are failing the mark in promoting a society in which our neighbors are being served and our planet is being protected, the ELCA adheres to the idea that we are then called to exercise advocacy on behalf of the entities being harmed.

We are fortunate to live in a democracy, which though battered and bruised, still clings to a system of checks and balances with the potential to restore respect and right relationship to our neighbors and the environment through just and ethical governance. With an urgency most of us could not have imagined even a year ago, we need to contact our state and federal legislators and inform them of our passion to create a world in which equality, justice, love of neighbor, and environmental protection are non-negotiable values - and to hold them responsible for supporting and promoting legislation which adheres to those ideals, and in urging them to oppose or modify legislation which abandons those ideals.

Here is how this will work: throughout Lent, four of us (*Kristin Foster, Crystal Whitney, Jenifer Moberg, and Bruce Garbisch*) will host a table in the fellowship hall following worship each Sunday, with information and materials designed to facilitate writing of letters and cards to legislators. Stamps, envelopes, note cards, and pens will be available, along with informational sheets providing background information on various chosen topics, general advice on writing a letter of advocacy, and suggested "talking points" for inclusion in an effective letter. This information has been thoughtfully prepared by experienced staff members from Lutheran Advocacy of Minnesota and MN Interfaith Power and Light. Both groups are faith-based non-partisan advocacy organizations, so the information comes already imbued with a perspective reflecting Christian beliefs and values.

Although Trinity's writers are welcome to address any issue of concern to them, five topics have been singled out for special focus (one for each of the five Sundays in Lent). These include immigration reform (Feb. 22), electronic waste recycling (March 1), data centers, responsible mining in northern Minnesota, and food scarcity in our society. Because this is a pilot project, letter writers are asked to leave their letters with the hosts (if they are completed in the fellowship hall that same Sunday), or to return them later to the church (if they are written at home), to allow for compilation of data which will help provide an objective assessment of various outcome measures.

We are hopeful that this venture can serve as a meaningful communal antidote to the nihilism and despair we too often succumb to in these incredibly challenging and discouraging times. All are encouraged to join the effort. A single letter from "just you" or "just me", seems small. So is a mustard seed. God reminds us through parable that through such a minuscule entity, the kingdom of God can emerge. That means life on this earth here and now as God would wish it could be, for everyone and for every aspect of the creation.

Please help Trinity plant as many mustard seeds during this Lenten season as possible. Can you wait to see what God might do with it? Write from the heart, and as though someone's life depends on it, because it surely does. Your letters from Trinity - like mustard seeds, or like the leaven hiding in the bread dough - harbor the potential to flourish and grow for the benefit of our neighbors and the world. That is part of the good news this Lenten season!



To our fellow congregants and visitors, I'm writing this as a follow up to the September 2025 Council meeting where it was voted to form and support a Welcoming and Reconciling in Christ (RIC) team to explore member interest in becoming an RIC Partner Congregation with our RIC NE MN Synod. Being a *Reconciled in Christ* (RIC) congregation helps us to live out our mission in several ways. Welcoming means serving all people, regardless of gender, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, age, size, language, economic status, education level, ability... all people.

There are several congregations in our Synod that have already begun this process and we at Trinity have formed our own team. We are early in the process, but I would like to introduce the team members. Our team consists of Julie Aune, Bruce Garbisch, Larry Lange, Vickie Lange, Vicki Lupica, Steve Maki, David Moberg, and Jenifer Moberg. Deacon Kari also sits in with us. We are working hard in learning and growing in our own process and we will keep the congregation updated as we move forward in prayer and commitment. If anyone feels comfortable approaching any of us to chat, you are more than welcome to do so.



And fun-favorite -- GaGa Ball!


Core Gaga Ball Rules

- **Starting the Game:** All players start the pit wall. Someone throws the ball into the center, and players yell "Ga" on the first two bounces and "Go" on the third, at which point the ball is in play.
- **Elimination:** A player is out if the ball hits them at or below the knee.
- **Hitting the Ball:** Use an open hand to hit the ball; it cannot be thrown, caught, held, or scooped.
- **Double Touches:** The ball cannot be hit twice in a row by the same player. It must touch another player or the wall first.
- **Out of Bounds:** If a player hits the ball out of the pit, they are eliminated.
- **No "Goalie" Play:** Players cannot sit on the walls or use them to avoid being hit.


